#### **Ordinary Time**

### **Reflections for This Week**

# As soon as Jesus was baptised he saw the Spirit of God coming down on him

It may seem strange, but this is a Christmas Feast. Not if we think of Christmas only in terms of the Baby in Bethlehem, but if we have followed the ideas of the Feasts of Holy Family and especially Epiphany, and have seen the Season in terms of the growing manifestation or appearing of the Son of God: first to the shepherds and then to the wise men from the East. Now in the River Jordan, Jesus, Son of Mary, is revealed to all as the fullness of all God's promises: "This is my Son, the Beloved". On this day we stand before the revelation of God's love for us, such that he would send his only Son into the world. Christmas without the Baptism of the Lord, and the words that are spoken from heaven, would be incomplete, since it is only in them that we fully see the wonder of what happened in Bethlehem, that we fully understand the reason for the joy with which we celebrated Christmas Day. As we come to the end of Christmas today, and look forward to hearing the Gospel in Ordinary Time, we do so having been shown who it is we listen to: the only Son of God, the Beloved.

Marriage Matters: You are my chosen one: Today, Isaiah and Matthew talk of Jesus being 'the Chosen One' and 'the Beloved'. So often, we are aware of the times when our partner annoys us. We need to develop a sensitivity so that, when we are tempted to be critical, we remember that this is my 'chosen one' and look for ways to affirm our partner, our 'beloved'.

**Think Vocation:** At baptism, when we entered the family of God, we received the gift of faith as well as the promise of eternal life. Let us try to find out the name of the priest or deacon who baptised us and pray for them whether they are living or deceased.

#### Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI – Rest in Peace

Pope Benedict XVI served as Supreme Pontiff from 2005 – 2013. He died, aged 95, on Saturday 31 December 2022 in the Mater Ecclesiae Monastery in the Vatican.

Cardinal Vincent Nichols, President of the Bishops' Conference, said: "I am deeply saddened to learn of the death of Pope Benedict. He will be remembered as one of the great theologians of the 20th century. I remember with particular affection the remarkable Papal Visit to these lands in 2010. We saw his courtesy, his gentleness, the perceptiveness of his mind and the openness of his welcome to everybody that he met. He was through and through a gentleman, through and through a scholar, through and through a pastor, through and through a man of God – close to the Lord and always his humble servant. Pope Benedict is very much in my heart and in my prayers. I give thanks to God for his ministry and leadership."

Bishop John, in his homily at the diocesan Requiem Mass for Pope Benedict on Thursday, said: "Pope Benedict, by nature, by personality, was really quite a shy and retiring man. Intellectual, scholarly, certainly to a really exaggerated degree, he gave himself to his studies and that's really where he was working in his ministry as a priest. But he was called from that to take this immense responsibility for the Church. A Church in changing context. A Church global in its impact and working each day in 190 nations in different ways, in different people's lives. But Pope Benedict accepted that challenge and adapted his way of life to be all that he could be as our pope."

We are invited to continue praying for the eternal rest of Pope Benedict through this prayer written by Bishop John:

Loving Father, we ask you to welcome Pope Benedict into eternal life, rewarding him for his selfless devotion and service of your Church. May his example live on in our Church as we seek to be ambassadors of Christ in our daily living. As the family of the Church, we pray in communion that you will forgive any human frailty or transgression and bring him into the light of your presence where, one day, we may celebrate your infinite love and mercy together. May he rest in peace. Amen.

White Flower Appeal: Next weekend we will have our annual collection to support the work of the Society for the Protection of Unborn Children (SPUC).

**Ecumenical Service:** In two weeks' time, on Sunday 22 January, as part of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, Churches Together on the Height will hold a joint service at 3pm at St John's Church. We were due to host this at St Luke's but the lack of heating made it advisable to seek a different venue!

**Mikron Theatre:** Just to give you advance warning that the next production (raising money for Loaves and Fishes) will be on Wednesday 19 April at Ss Peter & Paul. More details to follow.

Votive Candles: We will shortly be taking advantage of a free trial offer for a new system of votive candles at both our churches. Called St Killians, it claims to be the cleanest, safest, and most environmentally friendly votive candle burning system in the world. The candle holders are made from recycled glass and, as the candles fit directly into them, there is no plastic or aluminium waste. As the candles burn, the final bit of wax drops through into a water bath(increasing safety) and this waste wax is collected for recycling. Salford Cathedral have been using this system for some years now, so you may have seen it already. We are awaiting a date for delivery of the trial stands/candles and will provide a bit more information about them at that time.

**Archbishop Patrick Kelly:** The former Archbishop of Liverpool, who was previously Bishop of Salford, had a bad fall before Christmas and has been admitted to hospital.
